## Food for thought

Peter and I shifted about 18 months ago. We inherited well established trees around the perimeter of the section but not much garden so we are now in the process of developing a garden to enjoy. We have a plan to follow but I'm impatient, I don't want to wait an age to see things established. I find myself looking on line at mature shrubs and trees. I'm tempted despite the price tag!

So I'm into planting and growing at the moment and yes, I know the best way to establish plants is to plant small and nurture to allow the root system to establish strongly and the plant should flourish better over time.

It's a great analogy Jesus uses when he likens the planting of the seeds of faith to a farmer sowing seeds, scattering them out knowing that some will grow and some won't. The conditions need to be right for the seed to take root.

I wondered though what Jesus intended with this parable? Maybe it was to encourage his listeners not only to be receptive but not to get discouraged when the harvest is slow in coming.

In my experience sometimes seeds of faith take ages to sprout and grow. Sometimes we sow seeds we're not even aware have made a difference and often we're not around to see the harvest of seeds we've scattered. Yet we are called to be good soil and to scatter seeds. Sometimes seeds of compassion and kindness and sometimes courage as we tell our own stories, especially the stories of how Jesus has changed and shaped our own lives.

Over the last couple of months we've heard a number of these stories and I know they have been an encouragement to those of us listening in our own faith journeys and an encouragement also to continue to sow seeds that might take a while to take root and grow.

It's amazing how God sends people across our paths at just the right time and if we take time to look back on our faith journeys we can see God's hand and identify those who have planted the seeds for us.

So be encouraged to keep scattering the seeds. I'm reminded of Paul's words to the people of the Church in Corinth. He says: "*I planted the seed in your hearts and Apollos watered it, but it was God who made it grow.*" 1 Corinthians 3:6)
